


## FOREWORD

It has been one of the primary concerns of the teacher-training program at the Normal College during the past year to have the present graduating class become aware of the problem as it affects them, so that they might be prepared to go out into the schools of the Province not merely as purveyors of techniques but as wholesome personalities equipped with a knowledge of human affairs that will enable them to carry on their work in inculcating worthy attitudes in the children whom it is their privilege to guide.

I am sure that we of the Normal College staff will not be disappointed in the promising group of the 1951 graduating class. Our best wishes go out to you all in the very important work you are about to undertake.

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# The College Year

Fifty men and three hundred women! A man won't have a chance here this year—The whispers spread furtively through the group of young men who waited for the Normal College Year to begin. The Normal Year! It loomed before us as a series of questions, stark and unreadable. Now, from our vantage of experience, we have the answers to all, or nearly all, of these questions. But the gaining of the answers has provided us with one of the most exhilarating and fruitful seasons of our lives.
